

English: We are going to be using 3 texts by the same author this half term to support with oracy and writing. We will be reading Rachel Bright's 'The koala who



could', 'The lion inside' and 'The squirrels who squabbled'. Y2 will plan and write their own animal story with a logical sequence of events and Y1 will write a recount of events in sequence from the story 'The koala who could', with increasing amounts of detail in their work. Spelling, handwriting and composition will remain a focus.

Art: This term we will be learning how to create tints and shades to paint landscapes and animals in the style of local artist,
Lucy Pittaway.



Storytime / RfP:

We will read a variety of fiction and non-fiction texts, including poems during our shared reading time and focus on developing our love of reading!

If you would like to come into school and read one of your favourite stories to the children please let me know. You would be very, very welcome!






Maths

Y1 will be learning fractions, including halves and quarters, of shapes, objects and quantities before moving onto Place Value to 100. They will continue to practise Key Instant Recall Facts, including number bonds and counting in 2s, 5s and 10s. These are key to moving onto times tables in Y2.

Y2 will continue to learn the four operations of maths and

how to use these to solve maths problems for mass, volume, capacity and temperature, before moving onto fractions. They will continue to practise and become fluent with their 2s, 5s and 10 times tables.



PSHE: Our learning focuses on health and well-being, including physical, social and emotional health. All children will learn about strategies to support their own

mental health and wellbeing.



Science: In this unit the children will learn about 5 groups that scientists use to classify animals: mammals, fish, birds, reptiles and amphibians. They will learn to identify which group an animal belongs to by its features and will classify animals according to their group. They will also learn about animal's diets and what they eat, classifying animals into their groups: Omnivore, herbivore and carnivore.

Geography: This unit is learning about the world with a focus on human geography. It examines what the world is like outside of the UK looking at the 5 oceans and the 7 continents. This links to our previous geography topic

about the UK as we shall compare the UK to other countries and seas around the world.



Computing: We will be using computer

software to support our learning of how to use technology to produce digital writing.



PE: * Tuesday & Thursday *

We will be continuing to work in teams to develop our skills in sending & receiving and striking & fielding games.



Music: The children will learn how to listen to and describe a piece of music, perform rhythmic patterns to a pulse, organise their ideas to make a bigger structure and perform their own melody with lyrics to an audience. Using 'Finlandia' by the Finnish composer Jean Sibelius.
