Termly overview: Welcome back. We hope everyone had a great Christmas and New Year and is looking forward to 2025! We have lots of exciting learning planned for Year 4 and so, in anticipation of the wet and chilly weather, please ensure children have **spare shoes** in school each day to allow outdoor play and learning in all weathers! PE in school will be on Tuesday and the whole class will be going swimming on a Friday afternoon. If you have anything linked to this term's learning that you would like to bring in and share with the class, please let us know. Please continue to encourage your child to read most days, access Spelling Shed and Times Table Rockstars at least 3x weekly and, if they have a login, Reading Plus to complete 5 books per week. English: We begin by learning about newspaper articles, using our recent snowy experience to write our own.

We will focus on using subordinating conjunctions (e.g. when and because), becoming more consistent with our handwriting, and interviewing 'eyewitnesses' to practise our oracy skills. Then we move onto adventure stories, using 'The Firework Maker's Daughter' as a model for our own writing. We will use

expanded noun phrases (e.g. 'the snowy school behind locked gates') to add interest and detail to our work.



Storytime / RfP: Having really enjoyed last term's reading of 'The Nowhere Emporium', we are moving onto Philip Pullmans' The Firework Maker's Daughter, a great adventure story which will also get us in the mood for our own

adventure writing later in the half term.

Maths: We are learning different written methods of multiplication and division. To do this, we need to know our tables really, really well so please keep



practising at home – at least 5 minutes, 3 times per week on TTRS, if you can. This is also in preparation for the Multiplication Tables Check at the end of the year.

Art: We will be using our knowledge from our 'Rivers' unit last term to

paint our own pictures of rivers. We will study the work of Renoir and Afremov to learn



more about shade and tone and how to use paint to create different colours and textures. RE: We will be looking at what makes someone inspirational in order to consider why Jesus is inspiring to some
